Congratulations Year 6 – you have shown amazing courage, ambition, responsibility, perseverance and resilience this week and I am very proud of you all.

Ofsted Report

I am very pleased to be able to share the Junior School Ofsted report with you all—it arrived so quickly this time and says such lovely and very similar things to the Infant one (funny that)! Of course, I have my staff, pupils, Local Committee and you all to thank for such a glowing report and the opening paragraph says it all: 'Pupils are eager and respectful. They are highly engaged in learning and relish the curriculum's ambitious topics. The school has high aspirations for pupils, and they achieve well. Pupils feel inspired by the knowledge they gain. They are proud of their accomplishments and ready for their next stage of education.

Pupils treat each other and adults with respect. They feel safe at school and valued as individuals. Pupils develop a keen sense of personal responsibility. They uphold the school's rules and expectations without prompting. Playtimes are safe and engaging. Pupils relish interacting with each other and take up a range of leadership roles. Their manners are impeccable.

The school's personal development programme is exceptionally well designed. Pupils' opportunities are carefully crafted. Nothing is left to chance. 

Parking Update

I was joined by parents, local residents, Surrey Police, our local Runnymede Councillor (Carl Mans) Surrey County Councillor (Jonathan Hulley) and 2 other local councillors to discuss the thorny issues of traffic, careless driving, naughty parking and idling car engines (people who sit outside school, waiting for their children, with their engines running).

This was a very supportive and helpful meeting and I was very grateful to all who attended and contributed. A summary of our discussions is as follows:

How to report either Dangerous Use of Vehicles (eg driving on a pavement or blocking the road for emergency vehicles) or Anti-social Behaviour (eg parking across a driveway and blocking resident access out of their home) – Please google Surrey Police, go to their website and report online what you have seen. Photos or video footage are very helpful, as is a car index/registration number.



We also reviewed what is already happening from Surrey Traffic Enforcement. Thanks to Jonathan Hulley, there was a parking review and our school is one of 16 in Runnymede identified as High Priority because of the number of concerns around illegal or selfish parking. We now have weekly enforcement patrols. Our feedback at the meeting was that we would like the patrols to change the timings of their visits so that they are patrolling as parents arrive to park. We also asked them to be vigilant and not shy about issuing fines. You have been warned!

To support enforcement the meeting requested that the yellow lines along Bousley Rise, Fletcher Road and Fletcher Close were cleared of debris and repainted so that they are clear and visible. Some residents from Colebrook have requested a review of yellow lines there.

The meeting moved on to explore some other local solutions, all of which have pros and cons and will affect residents and visitors to the GP Surgery. Some of these included creating a School Street System (where only permit holders can drive along identified roads at key times) or a temporary one-way system at certain times through the school end of the village, via Spratts Lane. Obviously, as these will have a bigger impact on residents, discussions will continue between residents, Runnymede and Surrey Councils about these, along with suggestions to reduce the speed limit.

Finally, we talked through some other anti-social behaviours such as people who arrive to collect children and then sit in their cars with the engine running, polluting the streets, people who park in the private roads (Spratts Lane and the bottom end of Bousley Rise, both areas for residents only) and people dropping litter. Both of these are rather selfish and we will be working with the children to encourage you all to stop doing this please.

PE Safety

Can I please remind all parents that it has long been a policy in all Surrey Schools that all jewellery (including earrings) and watches must be removed before any PE lesson and that any long hair must be tied back please. In the case of earrings, these must either be removed by the child just prior to the lesson (not by staff) or removed by parents at home before they come to school. This rule will also apply to Sports Day.

For those of you whose children are desperate to have their ears pierced, can I respectfully suggest that the start of the summer holiday is the perfect time to do this without interfering with PE lessons. Thank you.

Finally, thank you all for your kind wishes – Mrs Ikin had her operation yesterday and is now recovering!

Receptions Social Action Project


